Action Requested:

As part of the Boulder County Public Hearing on August 4, 2022, staff is recommending that the Boulder County Commissioners adopt Resolution 2022-048, describing a proposal to extend the existing 0.10% countywide transportation sales and use tax for the purpose of continuing to fund transportation needs; and Resolution 2022-049, approving a ballot title for the November 8, 2022 general election to extend the existing 0.10% countywide transportation to extend the existing 0.10% countywide transportation sales and use tax for the purpose of continuing to fund transport transport the purpose of continuing to fund transport transpor

Background:

Since 2001, the current Boulder County transportation sales tax funding has been used for basic multimodal transportation improvements throughout the county including over 97 miles of paved road shoulders, 13 intersection safety improvements, 23 miles of regional trails, nine transit routes and support programs, plus six new pedestrian underpasses. These transportation investments connect cities and towns throughout the county, and reflect community-driven projects, programs, and services based on the input from the Consortium of Cities as well as on-going public input from residents and businesses. The county has also leveraged these local County sales tax funds to secure additional state and federal transportation funding.

Boulder County's current 0.1% countywide transportation sales tax sunsets on June 30, 2024. Over the last several months, Boulder County staff from multiple departments have

been exploring options for continuing this transportation sales tax beyond 2024 in order to implement the projects and programs from the Boulder County Transportation Master Plan. This exploration process has included technical, financial, and environmental analysis of various potential sales tax levels to continue funding multimodal transportation system improvements as identified in Boulder County's 2020 <u>Transportation Master Plan</u> (TMP).

In addition, Boulder County representatives have attended meetings with local jurisdictions and community stakeholders to share information on potential funding options and seek input to help frame recommendations. In addition, Boulder County conducted a 2022 <u>Public Opinion Survey</u> to gauge voters' support on several potential sales tax funding levels for extending the transportation sales tax. The results of the public survey show that approximately 69% of the respondents would support an extension of the current 0.1% transportation sales tax.

Extension of the current transportation sales tax funding will allow Boulder County to continue to provide safe, sustainable, affordable, and equitable transportation options for people throughout the county, connecting people with neighboring communities as well as with the broader Denver metro area and the Front Range region.

This proposed extension provides opportunities to leverage regional, state and federal grant opportunities and multi-agency partnerships. For example, typical transportation grant funding applications provide 80% of the project funds needed to complete a project from state and/or federal sources, which allows Boulder County to contribute the 20% local matching dollars. As a recent example from earlier in 2022, Boulder County was able to combine approximately \$400,000 dollars in local county funds with funding from other agency partners to leverage over \$14 million dollars in federal funding for the CO119 highway corridor. Continuing to have local county funds available to pursue state and federal funding is particularly critical at this time given the new state transportation funds available through Senate Bill 21-260 as well as the new federal Infrastructure Bill.

Check-ins with the countywide Consortium of Cities, agency partners, and other similar processes with local communities, plus on-going public engagement will help to ensure that the priorities for investing these critical transportation funds will reflect the public goals and county's dynamic mobility needs over time.

If the current transportation sales tax funding is not extended beyond mid-2024, most of the existing multimodal transportation projects, plus existing transit services, trails, and mobility programs, will cease and the county's focus will need to be dialed back to focus on basic maintenance of existing county roads.

Staff Recommendation

Staff is recommending the County Commissioners set the attached ballot language for the November 8, 2022 election and adopt resolutions 2022-048 and 2022-049 to ask voters to approve extending the current 0.1% sales tax level for on-going multimodal transportation improvements, including funding for county-wide roadway safety and resilience projects, public transit, regional trails and commuter bikeways, regional multimodal corridors, and mobility programs as outlined in the county's overarching 2020 TMP and 2022 Mobility &

Access for All Ages and Abilities Plan. The proposed investment list for 2024-2039 is included as Exhibit A.

More detailed information is available on the Boulder County <u>website</u>. Boulder County staff appreciates the consideration by the BOCC for this important potential ballot item to extend the existing transportation sales tax at the 0.1% level.
